Even though our lives take on a feeling of frenzy during this season, we can benefit from taking time to rest in the arms of God. One of the best ways for me to do this is with poetry...especially that of Ann Weems. I would like to share this with you for your reflection during this season of expectation:

by Ann Weems

Cultivating Attentiveness in the Season of Advent

How do we “cultivate” attentiveness you may ask? As author and UM Pastor Pamela C. Hawkins shares in her two recent books, *Simply Wait* and *Behold*, Advent is the time when we prepare, by faith, to celebrate the birth of Jesus. Advent is a season of good news and great anticipation. The prophet Isaiah reminds us that this good news comes for everyone—not only for those whose lives are aware and prepared to celebrate, but also for the many others who are oppressed and brokenhearted.

Hawkins tells us that there are words taken from scripture that will guide us along the way this season. She believes that we need to take the time to be attentive and to be intentional about our journey. During this year's Advent study in the Adult Sunday School class and in Sunday morning worship, try to listen for words that define the season—words like expectancy, preparation, faith and promise. These are words that may make the season more meaningful for you.

Here's what the author says: “Advent living is what Advent leads us toward: the Word embodied, Immanuel—‘the Word became flesh and lived among us’ (John 1:14).” She goes on to say “I hope that you will become freshly open to ‘behold’ the ancient Advent story of God's self-giving of Immanuel, the Word made flesh, and to cultivate an ongoing attentiveness to what God has promised, is promising and will promise to do in the world in the name,

power and spirit of Jesus the Christ.” (Reread that sentence a few times!!) This year, as you prepare for Christmas, we suggest that you make some time for reflection, prayer, reading scripture, singing and Christian service. It is our hope that these Advent practices will help you discover a deeper spiritual attentiveness to what matters to God about the gift of Jesus. This is an opportunity to witness the wonder of the Advent season. Take the time to cultivate attentiveness!

Haiti University Student Update

As you may know, be-

cause of the flood in Haiti, several of our students at the university level have continued their education by moving to the Dominican Republic. Here is a way to help with flood relief that will make a difference.

We want to honor our commitment to our Haitian students attending the university in the Dominican Republic. We have been raising funds to support them, and we are getting close but time is short. Of the five men, three are totally supported at the present time, and two are supported for one of three semesters. Here are expenses for one student for one semester (3 ½ months):

tuition	\$ 555
rent	\$360 (\$90 per month)
food	\$600 (\$150 per month)
books	\$300–\$600
Total	\$2,115
	or \$6,345 per year.

It is with a grateful heart that I can say that tuition is nearly covered for the January through April semester. Two of the men have 3 ½ years to complete their degree in computer technology and and one has 4 years to complete a civil engineering degree.

Our commitment to these students is sizable, but each man looks forward to returning to Haiti to help others as he has been helped.

Thanks to everyone who contributed to the Haiti Dessert Auction. The \$1,700.00 that was raised will be applied to the tuition.—*Judy Hinderliter for the Haiti Committee*



LUMC Work Teams to the Southern Tier

Work teams from Lansing UMC have start-

ed work trips to help those devastated by floods. LUMC's effort is being organized by Marcia Lynch and Pat Pryor.

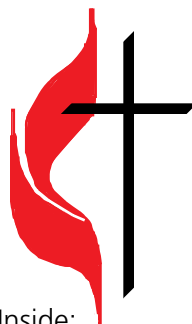
In November, teams went down on two Saturdays and helped flush out mud and spray for mold in two basements. One basement had been filled to the floor joists with a mix of water, mud, and fuel oil. When the owner started to clean it out, he contracted a chemical pneumonia and could not work down there. The other house had water up to the kitchen counter and the cleanup project was just too much for one person to handle.

In both cases, the owners said that it was hard to accept outside help, but the job is more than is humanly possible for individual residents. The house pictured above looks fine outside but is condemned, as indicated by the sticker. It's in a neighborhood full of houses with stickers on them.

Talking with the residents, it's clear that FEMA and insurance money falls far short of what is needed to rebuild these houses.

Shortage of money and the sheer volume of work to be done are not the only issues facing the residents of the area from Binghamton to Owego. There's also the loss of neighborhood and the feeling that they have been forgotten.

So, if you have a Saturday to spare, contact Marcia or Pat and plan to help out with flood recovery. Teams will be going in December.—*gw*
